# Introductory Trainings to Good Practices

## **A** Assertive Coping strategies and Anger Management for Young People

Ratolest Brno, Czech Republic

This training introduces a mixed-methods approach to working with young people on anger and violent tendencies – be it connected to group hatred or not. The approach combines activities that help to reflect on reactions in difficult situations, strengthen self-control and develop alternative strategies of coping with anger and provocations.

## **B** Romantic Violence

People in Need, Slovakia

The training presents a toolkit that is inspired by the book “Romantic Violence”, written by former neo-Nazi Christian Picciolini, to be used in schools and other settings. It includes various activities that help young people to reflect on identity, causes and consequences of right-wing extremism, prejudice, labelling, and active citizenship.

## **C** The Cyberscout Training Programme ARC

Fund/Bulgarian Safer Internet Centre, Bulgaria

The Cyberscout Training Programme provides training on dealing with and combating the most dangerous online risks to 5th-graders. These students become peer educators and role models. They give informal advice to their peers and work with 9 – 15 year old youth on topics, such as media literacy, hate speech and fake news online.

## **D** Mediation and Restorative Practices in Schools

Partners Hungary Foundation, Hungary

Mediation and restorative justice are established practices deal with conflicts in an alternative and non-violent way through enabling communication and cooperation between involved parties, reconciliation and mutual understanding instead of mere punishment. This training introduces basic methods and skills for facilitators with particular focus on their implementation in schools.

## **E** Journalist Skills

YMCA Dobrich, Bulgaria

(Social) media influence young people’s opinions, attitudes and lives. This workshop introduces a set exercises for young people in different contexts in which they learn actual journalist skills. By creating different types of journalistic outputs themselves, they can reflect on how information and emotions can be conveyed in the media and how fake news and hate speech operate in order to recognise it and spread positive messages instead.

## **F** Youth Culture Work

Cultures Interactive, Germany

The training introduces CI’s youth culture approach. By combining practical and creative activities based on youth cultures and (social) media with non-formal civic/ political education, youth culture work enables dialogue, strengthens democratic values and helps to prevent discrimination, group hatred and extremism – and it provides an opportunity for young people to learn new skills and methods of youth cultural self-expression.
